# Hey Joe Canyon



Hey Joe Canyon, a site of some mining ruins, is a short tributary to Labyrinth Canyon of the Green River. To get into the canyon, one must travel about 20 miles of pavement and 10 miles of good dirt road to the rim of Spring Canyon, where a spectacular ledge road winds down a 600-foot cliff to the canyon bottom. The trail follows the canyon about 2 miles to the Green River and is now a regularly maintained county road ("regular maintenance" is required because it regularly washes out). Another 9 miles upstream along the river in Labyrinth Canyon is Hey Joe Canyon. The trail along the river is subject to rockfalls and collapse. Although we occasionally cut back the brushy tamarisk alongside parts of the trail, fancy paint jobs may prefer another trail.

## Scenery

The access roads include the paved one in Sevenmile Canyon and good dirt roads in the open plateau country and into Spring Canyon to the Green River. Spring Canyon is a jewel. The trail enters Labyrinth Canyon at Bowknot Bend, a large loop of the river where the river doubles back and threatens to short-cut the loop in the near future, geologically speaking. There are abandoned mining roads on both sides of the river; remains of the cable that ferried equipment across the river may be seen.

## Surface

The road into Spring Canyon once carried ore trucks and heavy equipment but it is still subject to erosion from storms. It is now being maintained as part of the Grand County road system. The roads in Spring Canyon and Labyrinth Canyon are good dirt except where erosion has narrowed them or left rockfalls that required hand labor to make them at least passable.

## Trail Details

The Hey Joe Canyon trip is pretty easy to find. From Utah 313, the Dubinky Well Road is used to get to the Spring Canyon Bottom Road. Both of these routes are graded dirt roads on the Grand County road system. The Spring Canyon Bottom Road starts out in a pretty innocent way, crossing Dubinky wash close to the washes end at Hellroaring Canyon. It heads through a small hilly section, and then starts descending toward Spring Canyon. Then, all of a sudden, it rounds a corner, drops down a little hill, and wham, it starts out on the almost sheer face wall of Spring Canyon. The county tries to keep this graded, but local rains can erode this section rapidly, so all bets are off on the shape it will be in at any given time.

Once on the face the road hangs on the edge as it begins its descent to the Green River. Finally it begins a section composed of a few switchbacks to get to the canyon bottom. Just as the Green River

is drawing near, the canyon bottom opens up. The next part of the trip heads right to start going upriver along the banks of the Green. This part of the trail travels through a lot of tamarick that grows along the river, and even annual pruning trips by the Club help but can't totally keep the branches totally at bay. There are also some sidehill sections to lean one toward the river, and a few rocky sections where rockslides have been repaired by hand. Once at Hey Joe Canyon the old mining remains may be toured before the return trip begins to retrace the route in. Wet weather would require cancellation of the trip; the road is scary when dry and terrifying (dangerous, too) when wet.

from Moab.

Parking instructions: Try to park above the pithouse toilet, but you may need to turn around first

and back down from above and adjacent to private property and gate.

From the Pack Creek Campground, Go back down the road you drove in on and turn left onto the

gravel road by the creek (USFS 719). Go past minor road to left, about 2 miles up. Stay left when

road forks further up. Gains about 1500 ft of elevation from bottom to top.

near the circular turn-around where the paved road veers left toward the reservoir.

## Fisher Towers Trail

Fishers Towers Trail is part of the National Trails System, which is a network of scenic, historic, and recreation trails created by the National Trails System Act of 1968. These trails provide for outdoor recreation needs; promote the enjoyment, appreciation, and preservation of outdoor areas and historic resources; and encourage public access and citizen involvement.



**Length of Hike:** 2.2 miles one-way to ridge at trail's end; allow 4 hours round trip.

**Type of Hike:** Constructed trail.

**Area Attractions:** Close up views of the Fisher Towers and Onion Creek area. Distant views include the Colorado River, Castle Valley, Fisher Mesa, and the Book Cliffs.

### Fisher Towers Hiking Trail

**Trailhead Location:** Off Utah Scenic Byway 128. At 21 miles east of the Utah 128/US 191 junction, turn right and go 2.2 miles on an improved dirt road to a parking lot.

**Route Description:** From the parking lot (please sign in at register box), the trail goes down a short set of steps and then runs to the left out onto a small slickrock-covered ridge. Follow the ridge away from the main cliffs until just after it narrows and then go left down into the ravine through a small cut on the left side of the ridge. From the bottom of the ravine, the trail heads steeply up and then begins to wind directly beneath the Fisher Towers. After swinging around the largest tower, The Titan, the trail ascends and ends on a ridge with a panoramic view.

The Fisher Towers are composed of Moenkopi and Cutler sandstones, and have eroded into many fantastical shapes. Climbers occasionally scale these mudstone towers (be cautious of hiking directly below a climber!).

**Note:** This trail has a western exposure and can be exceptionally hot on summer afternoons. Neither mountain bikes nor motorized vehicles are allowed on this trail.

passing lane. Turn right at the top of that hill.

Parking instructions: Parking area is located immediately after the cattleguard.

From the parking area, go north along the road to the first well traveled dirt road to the right. Ride

north to the red rock domes. Veer left, ride down a big sand hill. Stay on the road through a couple

ride east to return to your [vehicle](#).
